

RedBridge Group and Accent Research Queensland state poll

Prepared for the Australian Financial Review

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Methodology

The fieldwork for this survey was conducted between Monday 24 November and Monday 8 December over online panel. The sample of N = 818 Queensland voters aged 18 and older were recruited to fill quotas based on age, gender, location, education and vote at the 2025 federal election.

Rim weighting was used to apply interlocking weights for age, gender, education, religion and location. The efficiency of these weights was 78 per cent, providing an effective sample size of 638.

Based on this effective sample size, the margin of error (95 per cent confidence interval) for a 50 per cent result on the full sample is \pm 3.9 per cent.

This is larger for subsets of the data, such as age or location, and results based on these and similar breakdowns should be interpreted conservatively.

Vote intention questions were located immediately after demographic items and other questions used for screening and quotas. Undecided respondents were asked a leaner question. Those who refused to or were unable to provide a vote intention in both the initial question and leaner made up seven per cent of the sample, and were excluded from published vote intention figures.




Figure 1: Vote intention for the Queensland Legislative Assembly, by location and financial stress.




Figure 2: Vote intention for the Queensland Legislative Assembly, by demographic characteristics.




Figure 3: Vote intention for the Queensland Legislative Assembly, by education, employment status, household income and home ownership.




Figure 4: Perceptions of the Government and Opposition. Figures in black on the right-hand side of the plot indicate the net share who agree with each statement (total share who agree, minus the share who disagree).




Figure 5: Share of voters that think the Crisafulli QLD Liberal-National Government has the right focus and priorities, by state vote intention, location and financial stress. Figures in black on the right-hand side of the plot indicate the net share who agree with the statement (total share that agree, minus the share who disagree).




Figure 6: Share of voters that think the Crisafulli QLD Liberal-National Government has the right focus and priorities, by demographic characteristics. Figures in black on the right-hand side of the plot indicate the net share who agree with the statement (total share that agree, minus the share who disagree).




Figure 7: Share of voters that think the Crisafulli QLD Liberal-National Government has the right focus and priorities, by education, employment status and occupation, household income and home ownership. Figures in black on the right-hand side of the plot indicate the net share who agree with the statement (total share that agree, minus the share who disagree).




Figure 8: Share of voters that think Steven Miles and Labor have done enough to deserve to win the next state election, by state vote intention, location and financial stress. Figures in black on the right-hand side of the plot indicate the net share who agree with the statement (total share that agree, minus the share who disagree).




Figure 9: Share of voters that think Steven Miles and Labor have done enough to deserve to win the next state election, by demographic characteristics. Figures in black on the right-hand side of the plot indicate the net share who agree with the statement (total share that agree, minus the share who disagree).




Figure 10: Share of voters that think Steven Miles and Labor have done enough to deserve to win the next state election, by education, employment status and occupation, household income and home ownership. Figures in black on the right-hand side of the plot indicate the net share who agree with the statement (total share that agree, minus the share who disagree).
